Penguins


Penguins their feathers are waterproof, an Adelie penguin is 40-70 centimetres tall and they weigh 3.5-6 kgs.

It takes forty minutes, by helicopter, to get to Cape Bird. Cape Bird is home to forty thousand penguins and different birds.

Penguins have a special oil in their feathers so that their feathers are waterproof. The feathers keep them warm.

Global Warming


Global warming is bad to seals and some other animals. Some animals can become extinct.
